#### MEMBERSHIP DUES TO INCREASE

# The Adjudication Process: ACDFA's Keystone

### **Decoding a Valued Process**

Perhaps the most elegant and time-honored aspect of any conference is the well-honed adjudication process. It is a means by which experienced and new choreographers gain insight to their work via the feedback of an outside, objective eye. No



system is flawless, certainly, but the process employed by ACDFA can ensure that anonymity will not be taken for granted. Adjudicators are educated thoroughly in the disciplines and practices of the feedback session and are expected to honor the process and guard the integrity of the work with care and diligence.

When you attend a feedback session, a member of the ACDFA Executive Committee as well as your Regional Director will take you through the process. You will learn the fundamental components that make up the session and become aware of the practices that are used to protect anonymity. To that end, your help in this area is also critical.

Adjudicators do not know what schools are in attendance, who

there was discussion regarding institutional membership dues. Costs of running the organization have increased significantly but membership dues have not increased in 18 years. The last time ACDFA raised dues was in 1995, an increase from \$200 to \$250. That \$250 in 1995 dollars is equivalent to \$377 in today's dollars.

Budgets are tight for everyone and we know that every dollar counts. The decision to set dues at \$350 for a two-year institutional membership beginning Fall 2013 was not an easy one, but the Board determined it is needed to keep ACDFA going for at least another 40 years.

All institutions that are currently up-to date with their dues will not see the increase until the next renewal period.



choreographed the work they are seeing, nor are they made aware of what faculty are attending. ACDFA requests, that despite your school pride, avoid wearing t-shirts or sweatshirts that identify your school when in the feedback session.

The feedback session is a one-way conversation. The adjudicators will speak to the whole group and will not attempt to seek out individuals. With that, try not to call attention to yourself or your peers when it is time for your piece to be discussed. Feel free to take lots and lots of notes, but try to avoid getting the attention of the adjudicator. Likewise, if you hear something that may not delight you, try not to show outward signs of anger, disdain, or frustration. There will be time for all of that when the session is over.

The feedback process, remember, is a chance for you to hear the opinions of three strangers. Whether good or bad, remind yourself that your piece is your journey. You asked yourself the questions and now the adjudicators will essentially ask questions that were raised in their minds. Ultimately, what should result from the entire experience is greater connection to your work and most importantly, the acquisition of information whose value deepens with time.
